

WELCOME

Dear Colleague,

We are pleased to present the 2018 Foundation Giving in Colorado report. Our first report was published in 2008, with each subsequent year including additional data. Much of the improvement in the last few years is due to our partnership with the Community Resource Center (CRC) to provide current and quality data. This year's report includes an in-depth analysis of each of El Pomar's regions for a comprehensive overview of foundation giving throughout Colorado.

Our initial intent in compiling funders' data was to provide information to our regional councils to guide decision making as they identify existing organizations and major funding areas. We now include information that focuses on patterns in foundation giving across the state and distribute the report more widely. While foundation giving continues to increase, there are large disparities between regions and counties. For example, between 2013 and 2017, the Metro Region received an average \$137 million annually. In contrast, the Central Peaks Region received just over \$1.7 million on average annually, the lowest amount of grant dollars in any region during that time frame. A similar trend holds true when looking at per capita dollars granted. The annual average grant dollars received per capita from 2013 to 2017 in Denver County was \$155.70, while Elbert County received an annual average of \$1.78 per capita during the same time frame.

INTRODUCTION

Colorado is home to more than 5.6 million people. Of those 5.6 million, 3.6 million (64%) live in the urban Metro and Pikes Peak regions and 2 million (36%) live across nine rural regions (2010 Census).

Since the launch of the Regional Partnerships program in 2003, El Pomar Foundation has been interested in where foundation resources are invested throughout the state of Colorado. Since 2013, when Community Resource Center (CRC), Boettcher Foundation, and El Pomar Foundation piloted a project to map the financial impact of grants in regions of Colorado, El Pomar Foundation and CRC have requested funding data from funders across the state.

This report, the product of the data collected by CRC, provides a glimpse at funding in Colorado by Colorado-based foundations between 2013 and 2017. It is outside the scope of this report to provide interpretations of the data. This report is designed for El Pomar's regional councils, and therefore, the report utilizes grant categories and regions as designated by El Pomar Foundation. As this is a tool that may be useful to others, it is also shared with those interested in Colorado philanthropy, including nonprofit organizations, foundation staff, individual donors, and the public sector. The report may help individuals, nonprofits, and foundations to identify areas for increased outreach, education, and opportunities to collaborate to leverage impact.

ABOUT THE DATA

The summary of Colorado foundation giving is based on the grant data collected by Community Resource Center (CRC) between 2013 and 2017, which includes the grants self-reported by 76 of Colorado's independent and community foundations. Grant amounts may represent the full authorized amount of the grant or the amount paid in that year, depending upon the information made available by each foundation. Eleven foundations are represented with 2017 grant data, as indicated in the report, and the rest are represented with 2016 grant data, as more current data was not available in time for inclusion in the report.

The first section of the report entitled "2013-2017 Giving in Colorado" presents average giving over the past five years. Averages are used to mitigate the effect of possible outliers between years to provide a general overview of giving across the state. The second section entitled "2016 Regional Giving in Colorado" only presents giving that occurred in 2016. This is to provide as specific and current information as is available on giving in the regions.

To design the maps throughout this report in a way that is both accurate and informative, colors were assigned for equal ranges of grant dollars received. However, for maps with significant outliers, outlier colors are assigned.

Given the numbers reported in the Colorado Association of Funders 2018 Giving Report, this set accounts for approximately 31% of the \$900 million given annually by foundations in Colorado and 6% of the roughly 1,375 active Colorado grant making foundations.

ABOUT THE DATA (cont.)

The report also relies on a variety of other data sources. Information on poverty and median household income are based on 2016 U.S. Census Bureau statistics. Population information is based on estimates produced by the State Demography Office. High school graduation rates were gathered from the 2017 KIDS COUNT! In Colorado report.

Since the report is primarily prepared for use by El Pomar's regional councils, information is prioritized and presented in a way consistent with council priorities. Therefore, the report may insufficiently meet the needs of external groups. For example, most data is presented on a region-wide basis which might be inconsistent with regional groupings used by external partners. Additionally, funding is categorized by focus areas of interest to El Pomar's regional councils - this categorization may not be beneficial to those external to El Pomar.

Grants are categorized based off of the main focus or mission of the recipient organization. For example, if a school received funding from a health-focused foundation for a nursing program, it would be put into the Education category because the organization running the program is a school, rather than Health for the content of the nursing program or the health foundation awarding the grant.

Examples of categories include but are not limited to:

Arts & Culture - theaters, operas, symphonies, historical societies, county fairs

Civic & Community Service - rotary clubs, senior centers, counties, cities, community foundation, sports corporations, community centers, environmental groups, religious community organizations

Education - universities, schools, education groups, museums, early childhood learning

Health - mental health, substance abuse, physical activity, nutrition, hospitals, research, sports centers

Human Services - shelters, youth services, family resource organizations, workforce development, senior services, food banks



Regional Partnerships is comprised of community leaders who form regional councils that represent all 64 counties in Colorado. These councils advise El Pomar's Trustees and recommend grants to impact the greatest needs in their communities. In 2018, each of the 11 councils was allotted \$200,000 to recommend in grants within its region.

Annual average per capita funding in the San Luis Valley Region compared to the Central Peaks Region GIVING IN COLORADO 2013-2017







OVERVIEW OF REGIONAL GIVING

Percent of County Population in Poverty



Area of Funding







Percent of County Population in Poverty









LIMITATIONS

This report provides an overview of foundation giving in Colorado. However, the report has limitations that should be considered before drawing conclusions from the data provided. Despite these limitations, we believe the Foundation Giving in Colorado report provides an insightful look into giving across the state by representing key trends in giving in Colorado.

The grant information is voluntarily self-reported by each foundation, with no external verification. Information regarding the type of support and funding categories is consistent throughout the data set, but the specific categorization may differ from how each grant was defined by the funder.

Additionally, this report summarizes foundation giving by 76 Colorado foundations which is approximately 31% of foundation giving in the state. Therefore, any inferences made from the report should be understood as based upon incomplete data. For community foundations, the set includes all grants reported, including pass-through funding. Scholarship and sponsorship dollars, as defined by each foundation, are not included.

Of note, each year El Pomar Foundation and CRC collect annual giving data from as many foundations across the state as possible, meaning that different amounts of longitudinal data are available for different organizations. Therefore, representations of giving over time, such as the display of averages, may be inaccurate or inconsistent. Additionally, since this data set differs slightly from that used in the previous Foundation Giving in Colorado reports, we caution against drawing conclusions based on differences in funding between editions of the report.

The purpose of this report is solely to present descriptive statistics and represent the data collected as accurately as possible. No advanced statistical methodology, analysis, or additional research was used to explain relationships between variables or trends. Therefore, we caution against attempts to explain the statistics without additional research.
