

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

The American Rescue Plan Act is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill signed by President Biden on March 11, 2021. This landmark bill includes a number of provisions that directly benefit individuals and families. Our goal with this document is to ensure our partners and communities are aware of these benefits, the eligibility requirements, how to access them, and where to go for additional resources.

INCOME

√ Extension of expanded unemployment benefits:

- → \$300/week supplement through September 6
- → First \$10,200 in unemployment benefits for 2020 not taxable for households with incomes under \$150,000
- √ \$1,400 direct payments:
 - → Begins to phase out for individuals making \$75,000, single parents making \$112,500, and households making \$150,000
 - → Individuals making more than \$80,000, single parents making more than \$120,000, and households making more than \$160,000 are ineligible
 - → All eligible adult dependents, including college students and SSI and SSDI recipients, will receive payments
- √ 15% increase in food stamp (EBT) benefits extended through September
- ✓ Expansion of child tax credit for 2021 tax year:
 - \rightarrow \$3,000/child up to age 17
 - → \$3,600/child under age 6
 - → Fully refundable; **half** can be sent out in 2021
- Expansion of child and dependent care credit:
 - → Fully refundable
 - → Maximum benefit is \$4,000/eligible individual or \$8,000/two or more eligible individuals
 - → Based on **50%** of value of eligible expenses
 - → Income limit increased to \$125,000 for households

- ✓ Expansion of earned income tax credit:
 - → Age limit lowered to 19, upper age limit removed
 - → Maximum benefit for adults **not** claiming a qualifying child: \$1,502
 - → Limit raised on investment income to \$10,000 (indexed for inflation)
 - → Adults with children who do **not** qualify can claim it only for themselves
- ✓ Any (potential) forgiven student loan debt is
- √ \$4 billion for debt forgiveness for farmers of color
- √ \$1 billion for outreach and support for farmers of color
- Extension of Mixed Earners Unemployment Compensation (MEUC) provides an additional \$100/week to any worker who:
 - → Receives a state benefit with a W-2 income
 - → Has more than \$5,000 in self-employed income
 - → Has independent contractor income in the previous year

- √ \$21.6 billion for rental assistance & utility fee programs (administered through states and local governments)
- √ \$10 billion for Homeowner Assistance Fund (administered through states and local governments)
- √ \$5 billion for Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program; must go to people experiencing homelessness and other at-risk individuals
- ✓ \$5 billion to state and local programs supporting people experiencing homelessness and other at-risk individuals
- √ \$4.5 billion for Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LEAP)
- √ \$750 million for housing assistance for tribes and Native Hawaiians
- √ \$500 million in grants for low-income homes to help with water service
- √ \$139 million for rural housing assistance programs
- √ \$120 million for housing counseling services

- √ 100% of premiums for COBRA recipients subsidized
- √ Temporary changes to the Affordable Care Act:
 - → Removal of income limit on premium subsidies; anyone is eligible if the cost of their premiums is more than 8.5% of their income
 - → Increasing subsidies for low-income households
 - → Anyone who qualifies for unemployment automatically qualifies for **maximum** amount of subsidies
 - → Protection for **any** ACA subsidy recipient from "clawbacks" (benefits that you have to return) due to income changes in 2020
- ✓ Medicaid and CHIP changes:
 - → Requires coverage of COVID-19 vaccines and treatment
 - → Allows states to give 12 months of postpartum coverage for new birthing parents
 - → New incentives for states to expand Medicaid coverage
- √ \$500 million for Emergency Rural Development Grants for Rural Healthcare (administered through USDA)

- √ \$130 billion for K-12 schools to safely reopen within 100 days:
 - → Can be used to improve ventilation, reduce class sizes for social distancing, hire support staff, and buy personal protective equipment (PPE)
 - → 20% must be directed toward programs that counteract COVID-19 learning loss
- √ \$40 billion for colleges and universities:
 - → 7.5% (\$3 billion) designated for historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs)
 - → At least half must go directly to emergency grants to students (administered through qualifying institutions' financial aid offices)
